## The Scene at HMP Pentonville

- Built in 1842, designed for 520 prisoners, now housing over 1,200
- Overcrowding leads to inhumane conditions
  - Example: prisoners living in small, filthy cells with broken toilets

# Staff Under Pressure

---

- Prison officers face extreme stress with daily alarms
- Violence common due to gang-related issues
  - Example: Officer Shay Dhury, injured trying to stop a fight

# Inmate Experiences

- 80% on remand, rest convicted of serious crimes
- Impact of overcrowding on inmates' mental health and rehabilitation
  - Example: An inmate witnessing his cellmate's suicide attempt



## Government Response

- Early release of offenders to ease overcrowding
- Concerns from inmates that this will not solve long-term issues
